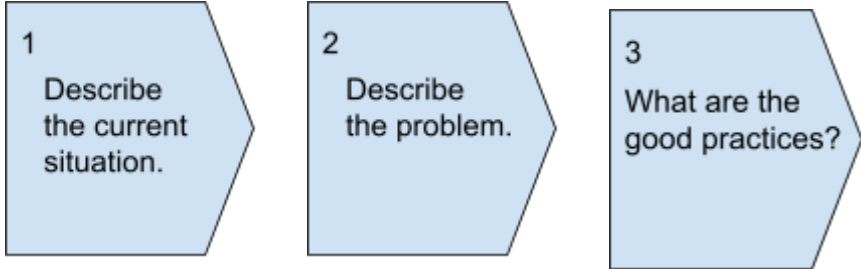

	<p>Results of the TNA identified gaps in the BBP field-based project implementers skills and capacities in processing and analyzing value chain data and translating these into project reports, case studies and news articles were used to develop a training of trainers (ToT) program on value chain data organization and management and report preparation.</p> <p>Lack of skills in these areas resulted in a delay in complying to project reporting and disorganization in data handling. This had an impact on the ability to comprehensively</p>

	<p>A Training Needs Assessment (TNA) was conducted for the BBP Project Implementers that:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• identified gaps in their skills and capacities to generate stories to populate the BBP website and</li> <li>• addressed these gaps through the implementation of a training program on value chain data organization and management and report preparation.</li> </ul> <p>Activities included:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Pre-testing of TNA questionnaires to field-based project implementers, representatives from the Viet Nam</li> </ul>

	<p>Environment Agency and BBP Office, Viet Nam</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- TNA orientation and survey in Ba Be National Park, Viet Nam participated by participants of the TNA pre-testing and, BBP Lao PDR and Cambodia project coordinators and staff</li> <li>- TNA survey in Vientiane, Lao PDR participated by traders and technical advisers of bamboo handicrafts and furniture.</li> </ul> <p>Conduct of A Training of Trainers (ToT) on Value Chain (VC) Data Organization and Management and Report Preparation in Hoang Lien, Sapa, Viet Nam.</p> <p>Key implementers are the ACB staff, BBP consultant Participated by the BBP CLV Project implementers and staff</p>

	<p>The training workshop achieved the following outcomes:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. BBP project implementers <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● gained new skills in organizing and managing VC data as well as</li> <li>● generated reports, case studies and news articles</li> <li>● trained trainers re-echoed what they learned during the 5-day workshop.</li> </ul> </li> <li>2. The BBP website was updated with new information.</li> <li>3. A network of contributors was identified and organized to generate content (contributions of data and reports) for the BBP website.</li> </ol>

	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. In every training design involving project implementers, a training needs assessment should be conducted to ensure that the modules developed and implemented are appropriate and match the identified needs of target participants.</li> <li>2. Ideally, a working knowledge on the English language should be one of the criteria for identifying target participants for a training workshop. But in cases where most participants are non-English speaking, it pays to invest in interpreters/translators and associated technology to ensure that the topics discussed are widely understood and appreciated</li> <li>3. ACB should explore apps and devices where: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. simultaneous translations from local language to English and vice versa can be conducted during the implementation of the workshop; and</li> <li>b. follow-up workshops can be conducted remotely through webinars for which projects requiring such can invest in online facilities such as ‘goto meeting’ (<a href="https://www.gotomeeting.com/">https://www.gotomeeting.com/</a>).</li> </ol> </li> </ol>
<p>Success factors</p>	<p>What are the conditions (institutional, economic, social and environmental) needed for the practice to be successful?</p>
	<p>The workshop exercises and other activities were designed with appropriate level of difficulty and adequate number of hours which stimulated the participants’ learning.</p> <p>Training modules were provided and enhanced the participants’ skills and improved their understanding on data research, gathering and analysis; and writing technical reports, case studies and news articles.</p> <p>The workshop venue was conducive for learning and food selection was excellent.</p>

Challenges	What constraints/challenges were encountered when implementing the practice? How were they addressed?
	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Over one-third, (35%) of the participants were not satisfied with the facilities of the training venue which could be attributed to the intermittent and poor internet connection.</li> <li>● Not all the participants can fully speak the English language.</li> <li>● Staff from the Thai Nguyen University of Agriculture and Forestry (TUAF) and the BBP Project Coordinator from Lao PDR assisted as interpreter/translators for participants from Viet Nam and Lao PDR, respectively.</li> </ul>
Sustainability	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● To what extent the practice is sustainable institutionally, socially, economically and environmentally?</li> <li>● What are the key elements to put in place for these practices to be institutionally, socially, economically and environmentally sustainable?</li> </ul>
	<p>Conducting training for capacity building of biodiversity conservation project implementers needs to be designed according to their needs. This involves identifying training needs (as what was done in TNA activities), developing training resources tailored specifically to the group, testing the training resources and modifying them accordingly. Budget for training including materials printing, travels and personnel costs must be allocated. Following up on the project implementers regarding their progress and support needed to apply the new skills must also be considered to ensure the success of the trainings provided.</p>
